The Crater

In Tanzania, in Africa, there are a <u>large</u> number of national parks and conservation areas. These

One famous conservation area contains an unusual and
<u>remarkable</u> crater. It is called a 'caldera' and is
all that is left of a <u>collapsed</u> volcano that is no
longer active.

The crater of the volcano is over 1000 metres high and its rim is often <u>engulfed</u> by clouds. The steep <u>descent</u> into the crater takes you to an <u>enormous</u> lake, which is <u>surrounded</u> by grasslands. The crater forms a perfect self-sufficient home for over 25,000 animals. The animals are not trapped in the crater and many move in and out freely. Because of the <u>protected</u> nature of this area, and the <u>availability</u> of food and water, most of the animal <u>population</u> choose to <u>remain</u> there all year round.

Various animals graze on the grass in the crater. Hippos laze around in pools during the

scorching hot days. There are

________ several prides of lion and some of the last surviving black rhino in Tanzania.

Groups of Maasai have <u>traditionally</u> allowed their cattle to graze here and they can often be seen in their <u>distinctive</u> bright clothes and <u>carrying</u> spears, looking after their herds of cattle. It is said when a lion and a Maasai meet face to face, it

is the lion that backs off first.

This whole breathtaking area has a <u>unique</u>, almost <u>magical</u> atmosphere.
